

BE PREPARED: PSALM 86

Prepare for it: Pray for God's help for this passage to change your heart.

Psalm 86 is a psalm of individual lament which is attributed to David. The psalm appears to be a response to some personal pressure that is not explained. The issues facing the psalmist do not resolve by the end of the psalm, but the psalmist's continued appeals to God and expectation that God will respond reveal a profound faith.

Read It: Psalm 86:1-10, 16-17 (www.biblegateway.com/passage/?search=Psalm+86)

For what does the psalmist ask? (v1) Why should God answer?

What relationship does David call on in vv2,3? What outcome does David expect for putting his trust in God? (v4)

Why does David call on God? (v7) Why will God answer? (vv5,6)

How does Yahweh compare to other gods? (vv8-10)

How does this psalm end? (vv16,17)

Think About It:

What marvellous deeds has God already worked in your life?

Does this psalm help you to "wait" on God's answers to prayer?

Get the Message

Psalm 86 is the psalm of a person who calls on God in the depths of their despair and anguish. In its opening words the psalm calls for God to hear and answer the one calling on Him. The psalmist's first reason for why God should respond to this call is not because the psalmist deserves an answer but because "I am poor and needy". It is in God's nature to care for the weak and the powerless, and here even the great king David recognises his need of God's help. In v1 David used the name God gave His covenant people (Yahweh) and in vv2,3 David continues to call on that covenant relationship; God can be trusted to guard David's life because He is David's God and David is His faithful servant. David knows God will honour His Covenant commitments and he expects God to deliver nothing less than joy. V7 tells David's reason for calling on God: "because you answer me". God's readiness to answer flows from His character ("You, Lord, are forgiving and good, abounding in love to all who call to you") and so David is confident God will hear his prayer. This confidence leads to an avowal of God's supremacy among the so-called gods of Israel's neighbours: "Among the gods there is none like you, Lord; no deeds can compare with yours". David's assessment of God's greatness is based on the marvellous deeds He has already accomplished in Israel's history. When this psalm was written that circumstances that afflicted David has not been resolved; the psalm ends with a repeat of the opening call for mercy and action on the psalmist's behalf. Even though this David's troubles are not resolved by the end of this psalm, he still has the confidence we can share: God is faithful and will save His people.
