

BE PREPARED: PSALM 130

Prepare for it: Pray for God's help for this passage to change your heart.

Ps 130 is classified as one of the seven penitential psalms, because of its themes of confession and trust in God. The ascription also classifies this psalm as one of the fifteen psalms of ascents, probably used by pilgrims as they made their way "up" to Jerusalem for the great feasts.

Read It: Psalm 130

What metaphor does the psalmist use to express their feeling of anguish when considering their sin? (v1)

What does the psalmist do in response to this feeling? (v2)?

What is the human situation without God's forgiveness? (v3) How does God's mercy change that situation? (v4) For what purpose are we forgiven?

What does it mean to "wait on the Lord" (vv5,6)? Why is the psalmist prepared to "wait on the Lord"?

What does the psalmist encourage Israel to hope for in vv 7,8?

Think About It:

In what sense can we "wait on the Lord" in hope?
Is Jesus your hope for relief from the despair of sin?

Get the Message:

This psalm's focus on God's grace led Martin Luther, the great church reformer, to call it a "Pauline psalm", because hundreds of years before Jesus' birth or Paul's ministry, it eloquently highlighted our inability to live a right life and our complete dependence on God's grace for forgiveness. The psalmist uses the metaphor of "the depths" (a deep hole or the bottom of the ocean) to describe the despair of recognising our sin and inability to always do what is right. But there is hope as, from these depths, the psalmist cries out to God for mercy. This cry for mercy comes from the clear recognition of the human condition: "If you, Lord, kept a record of sins, Lord, who could stand?" and the reality of God's grace: "But with you there is forgiveness". God offers this mercy so we can have a right relationship with Him, a relationship we can "we can, with reverence, serve you". Since the psalmist's only hope for salvation is that which comes from God, they are content to "wait for the Lord". Just as the night watchman knows their duty will end with the morning, so the "wait for" and "put their hope in" the morning, so the psalmist encourages all Israel to "put your hope in the Lord" because "with the Lord is unfailing love and with him is full redemption". This hope for redemption was realised in Jesus Christ, and available to any who believe Jesus is God's Messiah, as Peter, the apostle, wrote "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead," (1 Pet 1:3)
